

Artist Callout: AR, Audio, and Gamified Storytelling: Exploring Lincoln's Hidden Heritage

Project: Reimagining Lincolnshire

Introduction

We are seeking artists to create digital and hybrid experiences that bring Lincoln's hidden heritage to life.

Reimagining Lincolnshire is a bold, community-centred project that invites local people to recontextualise history and challenge who gets to tell it. This is not heritage for preservation—it's heritage for participation, welcome, belonging, and creative inspiration.

Through digital storytelling, participatory events, and a living archive, the project explores Lincoln's diverse histories, giving voice to stories often absent from dominant narratives. Artists are invited to create AR, geolocated audio, and gamified experiences that encourage audiences to explore Lincoln's streets, landmarks, and communities, connecting them to overlooked histories in meaningful and engaging ways.

About the Project

Project aims:

- Empower people through heritage by making history personal, emotional, and connective.
- Offer a sense of welcome and belonging, particularly for newly arrived communities.
- Reimagine archives as living spaces, centring multiple voices.
- Highlight underrepresented communities and local narratives that intersect with national heritage.

Community Aspirations:

- Challenge dominant narratives and reframe who is remembered.
- Connect stories to sites, streets, and shared spaces in Lincoln.
- Promote dialogue, reflection, and belonging through inclusive and participatory approaches.

Project Context & Artist Support

The commissioned experiences will **launch in February 2026 at Frequency Festival in Lincoln**, inviting audiences to explore the city and its hidden heritage through AR, geolocated audio, and gamified storytelling. The festival provides an exciting platform for artists to reach diverse audiences while engaging directly with local communities.

Threshold takes a **collaborative approach to working with artists**, aiming to support both creative practice and meaningful community engagement. On-the-ground support will be available to help connect artists with communities, local partners, and project resources. We work with our commissioned artists to ensure both the creation process and community involvement are supported in the best possible way.

To help artists develop their proposals, there is an opportunity to **book a one-to-one meeting during the application period** to discuss the project, ask questions, or explore early concepts. There are 10 places available, and we will do our best to accommodate as many applicants as

Creative Brief / Artist's Role

There are two different commission types available:

- 1. Community Co-Creation Commission (3 commissions)
 - Budget: £20,000 for creation + £5,000 for community engagement and digital skills development
 - Description: A community, co-created, digital hybrid experience in Lincoln. The process will provide opportunities for community co-creation and digital skills workshops.
- 2. Digital Hybrid Experience Commissions (2 commissions)
 - o **Budget:** £9,000 each
 - Description: Focused on delivering a digital hybrid experience in Lincoln..
 These commissions do not include community co-creation or skills development workshops.

Themes & Content Considerations

The project is driven by the redevelopment of the Reimagining Lincolnshire archive, an online repository that collates and shares these stories of diverse history. Within this project, we are gathering new stories, re-examining old materials and creating a new public-facing archive. The Reimagining Lincolnshire project drives the key themes for exploration (outlined below). Please also see additional materials for some of the existing stories for inspiration and research starting points. We are open to other stories that have a connection, relate to themes of the project and could be located within the city.

Key Themes:

- LGBTQIA+ visibility and gender representation
- Working-class women's activism
- Wellbeing and mental health
- Volunteer service personnel from Britain's colonies
- Modern life, sports, music, and nightlife
- Traveller communities in Lincolnshire
- Other stories linking Lincoln to national and global heritage

Key Considerations:

- Challenge dominant narratives and bring forward hidden heritage and narratives
- Connect stories to physical sites, streets, and community experiences.
- Facilitate reflection, dialogue to increase belonging and welcome.

• Approach community engagement with care, holding space for complexity, discomfort, and multiple perspectives.

- Brief artist statement and CV/portfolio
- Concept proposal (max 3 pages) explaining:
 - Creative approach and engagement with themes
 - Community engagement and skills sharing plans (if applying for the community co-creation commission)
 - o Feasibility within budget, technical constraints, and timelines
- Optional: sketches, visuals, or prototypes

Additional Information

1. Digital Requirements NHLF (Please ensure and read)

The commissions will need to meet these requirements, including:

- Outputs must be available for five years.
- Your digital outputs should be shared under an open licence. An open licence gives
 upfront permission to access, re-use and share digital outputs as long as the terms of
 the licence are met. Your digital outputs could include images, research, educational
 materials, environmental reports, software, web and app content, databases, 3D models,
 and sound and video recordings. The default open licence is the Creative Commons
 Attribution 4.0 International licence (CC-BY 4.0).
- Metadata, data and code produced by the project should be shared under a Creative Commons 0 1.0 Universal Public Domain Dedication (CC0 1.0) or an open software licence.
- If you use works already in the public domain, these fall outside the scope of this requirement, and you should identify these.
